


One million people listen to radio drama in the UK every day

- The only radio drama festival in Europe not affiliated to a national broadcaster


Drama from Europe and beyond





Listen live

- It's a chance to relax in an intimate setting, listen with others and lose yourself in a new world.
- We provide English translations for all plays – just like watching a film with subtitles



New experiences in listening

The only audience facing festival of its kind in Europe



- Anyone is welcome to drop in to listen for as long as they want
- The jury is a mix of professionals and audience members
- A unique audience award offers a prize based on online votes from across the world
- All work available to listen to online
- The festival takes work out to local audiences
- An outreach programme in Herne Bay invites local people to make their own work shared at a community showcase
- 150000 listeners across the globe


Discovering new talent

- Our awards go to the producers of the best work whether they are emergent independent professionals, established national broadcasters or the radio drama club at a secondary school. All compete on equal terms
- Prize winners at previous festivals have gone on to forge exciting innovative partnerships to develop new projects and win more prizes. You heard them here first!









The Next Generation

- We are working with partners from across Europe, including previous festival winners, to develop an exciting new programme to encourage young people to explore the art form for themselves. The project will include young refugees and migrants
- We tested this approach in a highly successful pilot weekend as part of the 2018 Festival.








Networking and debate


